This past year, I had the opportunity to witness firsthand the blessing Dr. Mouser is to a person and family when they are facing difficult and confusing times. I saw him gently and compassionately guide this individual and family through a process of making difficult decision. And because he helped them proactively make those decisions, they were greatly helped during their time of uncertainty.

With the busyness of his work schedule and caring for his young family, Dr. Mouser probably hasn't had a lot of time to be on the boards of organizations or committees. But he has been quietly making a difference in the most important venue of all – the lives of individuals and families going through the most difficult times of their theirs. He is certainly worthy of being part of the "Forty under 40".
