The 13 competitively awarded grants in Iowa that were able to raise the matching funds to receive the grant include:

Horizons: A Family Alliance Project, \$50,000

Healthy Food, Strong Community

The Food Environment Alliance, a collaboration of organizations that envision a strong community built on healthy food, seeks to increase access, visibility and learning opportunities for fresh food production, preparation and consumption among individuals living in Linn County, Iowa, who qualify for food assistance programs. Through a network of closely aligned programming, the Alliance will address gaps that create barriers to consuming at least five servings of fruits and vegetables a day for vulnerable children and families.

Cerro Gordo County Conservation Board, \$75,000

Mason City to Meservey Railroad Right of WayTrail Development (Phase 1)

The Cerro Gordo County Conservation Board is developing an abandoned railroad line from Mason City to Meservey into a walking and bicycling trail. The overall length of the trail is 21 miles and this grant is to develop the initial six miles.

City of Manning, \$75,000

Hospital Connector Trail Bridge

The Manning Regional Healthcare Center opened a new hospital, clinic and recovery center on the edge of Manning in May 2014 to replace a previous downtown facility. This created a very strong need for additional trails, so patients, visitors and employees could have pedestrian access to health care. In addition to the pedestrian transportation benefits, the trail will be used by many for active lifestyle and recreational purposes as it ties into a popular, existing trail, built in 2014.

City of Osceola, \$75,000

Osceola Safe Routes to School — Phase 2

The project is the second phase of a Safe Routes to School project. Phase 2 intends to construct multiple blocks of 6-foot wide sidewalks, including along a dangerous section of Highway 69 that has no sidewalks. This route will connect many children living in an income-based housing complex to the city's sidewalk network and the elementary school where Phase 1 sidewalks connected the central business district, middle/high school campus, sports fields, swimming pool and trails. The project includes education, encouragement, enforcement and evaluation components. The city, Clarke County

Development Corporation, Clark Community Schools, and a diverse community coalition are involved with and support this project.

# City of Sioux Center, \$74,805

#### Community Bicycle Trail Expansion

The funding will be used to develop a portion of bicycle trail from the hospital to the senior services campus in Sioux Center, Iowa. The new section of trail will connect with an existing 6.5-mile bicycle trail, further enhancing recreational opportunities for area residents. This project will expand safe and affordable exercise options, provide a community response to ongoing concerns about obesity and improve quality of life for many residents of the senior services campus, which is adjacent to the proposed trail expansion.

### Davis County Trails Council Corporation, \$75,000

### **Community Recreation Trail**

The Davis County Trails Council is constructing the initial 0.3 mile segment of the county's first multi-use trail. This segment will link several popular destinations in Bloomfield, including the city park, ball fields, elementary and high schools, swimming pool, day care center, and community college satellite office. When complete, a 1.5-mile trail will provide a complete indoor and outdoor recreation and exercise experience, anchored by the Mutchler indoor recreation center on one end and Davis County's premier county park, McGowan Recreation Area, on the other end.

#### Iowa State University Cerro Gordo County Extension & Outreach, \$75,000

#### Community & School Garden Development & Enhancement

Funds from this grant will be used to provide improved water access for the community gardens and an instructional greenhouse for use within the Mason City Community School System. Project collaborating partners include Iowa State University Extension & Outreach, Mason City Community School District, City of Mason City, Cerro Gordo County Department of Public Health, and Blue Zones Project-Mason City.

# lowa State University Foundation, \$75,000

#### **Production Garden Program**

This project proposes to design, implement and track a production garden program in order to create a long-term, sustainable solution to lack of fresh, healthy food in lowa prisons. An educational training program, developed in conjunction with the garden, will provide offenders with vocational and life skills, therby reducing recidivism through job placement.

Mahaska Community Recreation Foundation \$75,000

Mahaska Community Recreation Trail Extension

The Mahaska Community Recreation Foundation's trail extension project will build a new corridor to the existing 13-mile trail system. The 10-foot wide, concrete trail extension will link neighboring University Park. University Park will add a trailhead parking lot and a playground as a partner project.

Osceola Recreational Trails Association, \$50,000

Sibley Recreational Trail Project

The Osceola Recreational Trails Association Board seeks to provide a network of hard-surfaced recreational trails within the city limits of Sibley, Iowa, in response to the recreational and safety needs of Sibley's walkers, hikers and bikers.

• TRAILS, Inc., \$75,000

Iowa River Trail — Marshalltown Terminus

The lowa River Trail is a prospective 34-mile long scenic trail in development, embraced by two counties, seven cities and the lowa Natural Heritage Foundation. It links multiple scenic state and county parks, wildlife refuges and other amenities that afford close to 250,000 citizens easy access to miles of outdoor beauty. Because of the magnitude of this project, phased construction of the trail is planned. This request will help to fund completion of close to 1-mile of paved trail within the most populated community along the trail — Marshalltown, lowa.

United Way of Central Iowa, \$75,000

United Way of Central Iowa — Let's Go! 5-2-1-0

United Way of Central Iowa will replicate a successful obesity prevention initiative called Let's go! 5-2-1-0 in four elementary schools in Des Moines' highest-need neighborhoods. Let's Go! reaches children and families where they live, learn, work and play with a consistent message that promotes four healthy behaviors, which can be easily remembered with the numbers 5-2-1-0, including five or more fruits and vegetables, two hours or less of recreational screen time, one hour or more of physical activity and zero sugary drinks and more water and low-fat milk every day.

• Variety — The Children's Charity, \$50,000

Variety Star Playground

The Variety Star Playground is an all-inclusive playground (a playground created to be accessible to children of all abilities) that will be located in Noelridge Park on the northeast side of Cedar Rapids. This playground, the first of its kind in Cedar Rapids, will cater to children with and without special needs.
